"The Feast of Tabernacles"

"The fifteenth day of this seventh month shall be the Feast of Tabernacles for seven days to the LORD" (Leviticus 23:34, NKJV)

The Feast of Tabernacles is the seventh of the major feasts of Israel prescribed in Leviticus 23:33-43. Here are nine basic fast facts concerning this great feast.

- 1. It is also called "Succoth" (Booths) and "The Feast of Ingathering" (of the harvest).
- 2. The timing is for seven days each year, from 15 Tishri through 21 Tishri (October 16th through 22nd in 2024).
- 3. The offerings celebrate God's past, present, and future provisions.
- 4. It is the third of the three required pilgrim feasts under the Old Testament Law (Exodus 23:14-17).
- 5. In Jesus' day, there was a symbolic water offering in anticipation of God's coming provision of rain. Here, many see an indication of both Christ the Water of Life and of God the Holy Spirit.
- 6. There would be a waving of palm branches (Leviticus 23:40; Psalm 118:25) in anticipation of the coming of the Messianic King. In this, the coming of the Passover (Palm Sunday) concerned the First Advent, while the Feast of Tabernacles portends the Second Advent.
- 7. The Feast of Tabernacles, God "tabernacling" among men, is fulfilled in John 1:14, concerning the Messiah's First Advent.
- 8. The Temple Light Ceremony of this feast forms the backdrop of Jesus' words in John 8:12 (Cf. John 7:2).
- 9. The "Feast of Ingathering", the alternate name for this feast, finds its fulfillment concerning the ingathering of souls (Matthew 25:31-34). This fulfillment is in relation to the Second Advent, Messianic Kingdom, and Eternal Order.
